# CHILD PROTECTION AND SAFETY ACT SIGNED

President Bush has just signed into law the Adam Walsh Child Protection and Safety Act of 2006. It strengthens penalties against child predators. The Act also bars convicted sex offenders from having family-based petitions approved and makes failure to register as a sex offender a deportable offense.

In particular, section 402 bars all U.S. citizens and permanent residents convicted of a specified offense against a minor (as defined in section 111 of this Act) from ever petitioning for any family member (spouse, children, parents, siblings, fiancées) for permanent residency.

The Secretary of Homeland Security, in his sole and non-reviewable discretion, can determine whether a waiver of such bar is available if such U.S. citizen or permanent resident [a convicted child predator] poses no risk to the family member seeking permanent residency.
