# US VISA APPLICANTS ASKED NOT TO SUBMIT FAKE DOCUMENTS

The US visa consular section has requested visa applicants not to provide fake documents to avoid ineligibility for entry into USA. The use of fake bank statements, fake passports, fake visas, or fake identities will lead to a refusal. The State Department computer systems are very capable of detecting all types of fraud. Persons who engage in fraudulent activities are permanently ineligible for entry into the U.S., said a press release.

Be notified not to take advices from strangers, who call themselves visa experts, as they can do more damage than good. "Be careful of anyone asking for money to assist with visa applications. Many people attempt to sell fake documents or provide coaching for the interview. These services are very risky," a release from the Visa Section of the U.S. Embassy in Bangladesh stated.
